Camming Your High Performance Street Engine

Only you can decide what cam to purchase for you street driven high performance car. Check out the lift, duration, and overlap specs. Use the cam duration at .050 lift as a basis of comparison between manufacturers. Read the ads carefully. A cam with a "good" idle will work fine with a stock convertor and power brakes. Ca cam with a "fair" idle means it will sound healthy, it will still have enough vacuum at idle to operate power brakes, and you may need a convertor with a stall speed 500 or 600 R.P.M. over stock. Be very careful with a cam advertised as rough idle and powerful mid to upper range torque. It will shake your teeth out at a traffic light. It will require a vacuum reservior to operate the power brakes, a high stall speed convertor, and a low rear end gear. Do not over cam your street driven car. Remember that 95% of your driving is for daily transportation.

Install your new cam with new lifters, new timing chain set, and the proper assembly lube. Install your cam straight up using the factory timing gears and marks. Do not attempt to advance or retard your cam timing without taking the time to degree it in.

On Pontiac V-8's, use heads with screw in studs and pushrod guide plates. Increased valve spring pressure will pull the pressed in studs loose in the heads. If the guide holes wear oversize, you will start bending pushrods.

On Pontiac V-8 engines you can adjust the valves using the following procedure. On Pontiac V-8's adjust the valves before installing the intake and pushrod chamber cover. Turn the crankshaft so that the number 1 cylinder is on top dead center and ready to fire. Then adjust exhaust 1-3-4-8 and intake 1-2-5-7. Then turn the crankshaft one revolution, which will bring number 6 to top dead center. Adjust exhaust 2-5-6-7 and intake 3-4-6-8.

When you adjust the valves wiggle the pushrod up and down as you take out the slack on the rocker arm nut. As soon as the pushrod does not wiggle up and down and before the plunger in the lifter moves away from the spring clip, stop. This is zero lash. Now tighten the rocker arm nut 1/2 turn. You can see the plunger in the lifter more down away from the spring clip. This will give you the .020" to .060" lifter preload. By leaving the intake manifold off and the pushrod chamber cover you can see the lifter preload. You will not adjust the valves too loose or too tight. With the distributor installed correctly the engine will start right up.

During the first 1/2 hour of operation with you new cam. keep the engine R.P.M. over 1500 R.P.M. Don not allow the engine to idle. The new cam and lifters require plenty of oil to break in properly. All the parts have to get friendly with one another.

After the first 100 miles of driving change your oil and oil filter. Now you can enjoy your new cam. Listen to the sound of power as you idle thru the drive-in restaurant. Feel the new horsepower perform on the expressway. And remember when you really want to run it thru the gears, take it to the drag strip, it is easier on you drivers license and insurance company!

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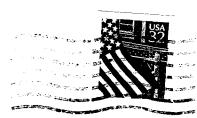
