

he predecessor to our beloved '64 to '72 GM A body, Tempest, LeMans, and GTO, was the GM Y body.

Pontiac's version of the Y body was the '61 to '63 Tempest and Lemans. The engineering on this car was way ahead of its time. In the front the suspension and engine were bolted to a crossmember that then was bolted into the unibody. In the rear there was a transaxle that bolted to a crossmember and then to the unibody. The engine in the front was connected to the transaxle in the rear by a torque tube which contained the driveshaft. The standard shift flywheel, clutch, and bellhousing was bolted to the rear of the engine.

If all this sounds familiar to you look at a C5, C6, or C7 Corvette from 1997 thru 2019. It is all the same design. When Motor Trend made the '61 Tempest its "Car of the Year" who knew how advanced the design was.

Like the Corvette the idea was to have a 50/50 weight distribution. Also, even after Pontiac offered the 326 V-8 in the car in 1963 it was still several hundred pounds lighter than a '64 GTO.

In 1963 Pontiac built six coupes and six station wagons with the superior dual quad 421 Super Duty race engine to run in the factory experimental class, A/FX. These cars had a 4-speed automatic transaxle.

These cars really flew and today the few remaining Super Duty cars have six figure values.

Today you always see a few '63 Tempests with monster Pontiac V-8's and converted to conventional rear ends running a good three seconds faster than the original Super Duty cars at any major Pontiac event.

The Pontiac design had a few flaws. The 4-cylinder engine was the right bank of a 389 V-8. This was in the days before 4-cylinder engines incorporated a balance shaft, so the engine vibrated at idle.

The transaxle design was shared with the Corvair and had swing axles rather than universal joints at each end. When Pontiac came out with the 326 V-8 in 1963 it was only offered with the 3-speed standard shift transmission or the Powerglide automatic. The Corvair based 4-speed transmission just didn't have enough torque capacity.

This car was ahead of its time. If GM had allowed Pontiac to spend more money on engineering it could have used a Muncie 4-speed with a redesigned case, input shaft, and output shaft. Also, the swing axles allowed the rear tires to tuck in on a hard corner. Redesigned rear axles with a u-joint at each end would have cured this. The so-called rope driveshaft was strong enough to hold a 405 HP 421 and they used the Tempest rear end carrier with a 3.90 gear ratio. In addition, the special 326 V-8

crankshaft is the same stroke as a 389 or 400 V-8 and the external dimensions of all three engines are the same. This crank shaft would have worked just fine in a 389 or 400 after it was rebalanced.

I have a friend with an incredibly unique version of this car. The original 4cylinder block is bored .060 oversize and uses Pontiac 400 pistons. The cylinder head is a big valve high compression unit from a GTO. It has the 2.11 intake valves and 1.77 exhaust valves. The intake manifold is a modified Edelbrock torquer with an Edelbrock 500 cfm carb. Exhaust is thru a Doug's header and it has a custom ground camshaft. Using DeskTop Dyno, I came up with a 237horsepower figure. Not bad for a 57-year-old 4-banger.

I got involved when the 4-speed manual transaxle gave up the ghost. Little did I know that the '63 Tempest 4-speed transaxle had a one year only cluster gear and we couldn't locate one.

To make a long story short the owner found a shop that could rebuild the manual transaxle using a Corvair cluster gear. The 4-cylinder 4-barrel carb Tempest engine was advertised as having 217-foot pounds of torque. The turbo charged Corvair in 1963 was advertised as having 210-foot pounds of torque. We don't know how much the modified

Tempest 4-cylinder engine makes but we hoped the gear set was over engineered.

This was the first time I ever wrenched on one of these cars. The magazines always called it as having a "rope" driveshaft but really it is a steel shaft that works like a torsion bar.

That was too easy now the Corvair based 4-speed broke again. This time it needs a cluster gear and what Pontiac calls a clutch gear. The clutch gear fits a '63 Tempest 4-speed only and we can't locate one anywhere. Also tried to find a good used 4- speed or a core I could rebuild with no luck. Bottom line we now changed the car over to a 3speed transaxle from a '63 Tempest 326 V-8. Which uses the same cluster gear and 2<sup>nd</sup> gear as a '58 to '62 Corvette Muncie built 4-bolt side cover 3-speed transmission. That should hold the horsepower and torque from a mighty 4-cylinder Pontiac "Little Indian." These gears were strong enough to stay together behind a Corvette V-8.

The attached pictures show the car as well as the '63 Tempest 3-speed transmission and rear end carrier and torque tube and drive shaft.

Thankfully, we had a 4-post lift, a high lift transmission jack, and impact guns.
















