
#### **GTOACO at Colo's Classic Car Show**





#### Hope You Checked Your Anti-Freeze By Steve Schaeffer

I hope by now you have checked the anti-freeze in both your collector cars and your everyday drivers. The attached picture shows what can happen if the system only has water in it, or not enough anti-freeze to offer maximum protection.

The engine block is cracked in the valley chamber. The original compliant was low coolant. It wasn't until he realized that water was getting into the oil that he realized he had a big problem.

At first, we looked for a blown head gasket or a cracked cylinder head. When we pulled the intake manifold and both cylinder heads, we found the real problem.

Of course, we had to pull the engine. Then tear it down to the bare block. The older our collector cars get the harder it is to find a good replacement engine block. Our machine shop was not interested in having the block welded in the valley chamber. They have not had good luck with that type of repair. Luckily this was not a number matching car.

After locating a block, it had to be hot tanked, magnafluxed to check for cracks, re-machined, assembled, and reinstalled in the car.

Fresh anti-freeze would have been a lot cheaper and considerably less work.

tried to remember back to the first time I actually remembered learning who Steve Ames was, but I couldn't. Not so much because my memory is going but more so that I have known who Steve is for as long as I can remember. See I have had the pleasure (and sometimes pain) of going to many GTO Nationals, POCI Conventions, Spring and Fall Carlisle events and of course Norwalk which we now know as the Ames Performance Nationals.

He was always there for the hobby, for us Pontiac people. Supplying quality parts, helping to support a good cause, sponsoring an event like Norwalk or the Parking Lot Party at our GTO Nationals. He always gave back.

I have several great memories of Steve over the years, especially after he sold the retail side of his business that bears his name. He would often come deliver parts, from his wholesale business to me at various events. That's when you would get to see the man behind the scenes. We would talk about his latest acquisitions for his vast collection, new parts that were coming out, the hobby, the business side of things and just life in general. I always enjoyed the time I got to spend with him.

In the winter of 2015, I took the best road trip of my life! Dad and I were headed to Nowhere New Hampshire to pick up the old "Ames Performance" Show Trailer from Kevin who now

owns the retail side of Ames Performance and we were going to visit with Steve at his shop and view his personal collection of rare and low mileage cars. Little did I know it was the last road trip for dad and I. Man do I miss him!

When we arrived at Steve's place, it was just a road leading into the dense New Hampshire woods. No flashy entrance, no paved drive, not even a sign, just a road. That is how Steve wanted things to be, plain

and simple. No need for frills or extravagance. Once you go back this long unsuspecting road, it opens up to a modest house on one side and three giant multi-level buildings on the other side. When we pulled in, we were greeted by the old familiar New England accent. We exchanged hellos and went inside.

I don't recall which building we started in, but I remember that my jaw hit the

floor as my eyes were taking in the sights of rare automobiles and my brain was trying to keep up. As we walked around, there were cars everywhere. Each building was full of cars that you just never see any more like Judge Convertibles (yes plural), a 58 Fuel Injected Bonneville, RAM AIR GTO's, Lamborghinis, a Buick GNX with 27 miles, a HEMI Cuda and on and on. After touring his three buildings all connected by walkways (it gets cold with a lot of snow in New England winter) I was in amazement of all these cars! Then I notice the tires on a Mustang GT 350 wrapped

in what looks like saran wrap. I ask Steve about this and he explains that when the cars get transferred to the "new" building they don't get rocks stuck in the original tires or damage the original paint. Wait...WHAT? There's ANOTHER Building?

We climb into an old Ford Explorer, Steve's winter beater and drive across the road. As we round the corner the headlights shine upon an enormous building! This is building number four and as we en-

> ter the front area. we are greeted by a 1958 Chevrolet Apache Pickup truck with just 3 miles on it. It had come from the Chevrolet Lambrecht Sale in the fall of 2013. Still adorning its dented roof, busted windshield, and years of dust dotting along with thousands of fingerprints of curious auction spectators. Still preserved just as it was when Steve bought it. See that is what Steve wanted to do, preserve. These cars are only original once and he wanted to be able to keep them

that way for generations to come. He wanted us to be able to experience the craftsmanship of the cars that we love so much today.

As Steve tells us part of the story of the truck, the auction and the people at the auction, my eyes wander through the doorway into the vast area and the sea of cars. As we enter the main area, I stop and take a photo of dad and Steve as they shake off the New England cold. Now it's pure automotive overload. I look around at five low mileage 455 SD Trans AM's, a Boss 429 Mustang, more GTO's, a 409

Chevy, some 40's era cars, 50's era cars, a 63 Buick Riviera gifted to Columbus's own Len Immke and on and on and on. My cerebral cortex is in hyperdrive as I try to take it all in, the sights, the stories, while reading the insanely low mileage or 1 of X posted on the windshields, trying to make sense of it all. The amount of time researching and finding these cars, the money that is sitting there, the stories each of these cars has and how Steve knows each story by heart is incredible. You can feel his connection to not only the car, but to the people that he got them from and his admiration for the fact that they preserved them so he could preserve them as well. Not sure how much time we spent looking at these cars, but it wasn't enough.

The building could hold about 120+/- cars and he still had about thirty or so that needed to be moved over from the other buildings. Dad and I talked about going back up once he had everything all finished and the cars moved in. But we lost dad that summer before we could. Steve had extended the invitation for my wife and I to come up and visit to tour through his cars once more, see the new acquisitions and spend more time listening to the stories that each of his cars have. I talked about doing it, but never did. Now I can't.

I have been extremely fortunate in my life to have

great experiences like this, I am blessed. At the same time there are missed opportunities, we all have them.
We all think that I will do that later or another time.
Sometimes later is never If you think you might regret

never. If you think you might regret not doing something, do it. It might be

too late tomorrow.




